

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD


Acts 10.34-43

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

Peter began to speak to those assembled in the house of Cornelius. 'I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ - he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.'

They said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping?' She said to them, 'They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him.' When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her,

'Woman, why are you weeping? For whom are you looking?' Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, 'Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away.' Jesus said to her, 'Mary!' She turned and said to him in Hebrew, 'Rabbouni!' which means Teacher. Jesus said to her, 'Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, "I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God."" Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, 'I have seen the Lord'; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

Three Reflections

Holy Saturday Philip Harvey

When I worked at the theological library in Parkville, years ago, one of my reference jobs one time was to assist a postgraduate student on research enquiries about her chosen subject of Holy Saturday. She regularly wore a tee-shirt she'd had made bearing the message in large letters: "Don't Ask! The Thesis Is Hell." This livened things up and was fair warning that she meant business. One benefit of being a research librarian is that, out of necessity, you can get to learn almost as much about the subject as the researcher. For example, what is Holy Saturday? From experience, it is the great lull between the shock and dismay of Friday and the glory of Sunday. It is a gentle autumn day in Melbourne. However, in terms of the prayerful attention to the Passion it is a time of rest and reflection. We live in that place and time, possibly not for the last time, where It is Finished. Judged from personal and shared experience, we each have our own thesis about Holy Saturday.

Attractive and helpful, I think, is the ancient reminder that it is the sabbath, wherein Christ is laid to rest after a week of extreme suffering. The command to keep that day holy is being kept in a very complete way. Living with the dead is something we do more frequently than we imagine, we speak their words and repeat their rituals, and here is a day in the calendar set aside for that purpose. It is a case of doing something simply by doing nothing.

Within tradition, then, there is the descent of Christ into Hell. We sometimes sing about this in the creed, depending on which creed. Hell is a subject no one wants to talk about these days, even when it's happening to them every day, or is plain as day. Sufficient unto the day is the evil thereof. Certainly, the overcoming of evil is one express meaning of the Descent and the lead of Christ on Holy Saturday is an example we are being told to pay witness to.

The early English term for this was the Harrowing of Hell. This is the understanding, put at its Wikipedia simplest, that "in triumphant descent, Christ brought salvation to the souls held captive there since the beginning of the world." A thesis is expected to explain, but sometimes a thesis must concede there are things outside human explanation. Sometimes all we can do is send a researcher in the right direction. That said, Holy Saturday is the lead in to the Easter Vigil. An autumn day may be spent convivially arranging flowers, polishing brass, practising joyous hymns, and designing the Paschal candle for the immense service of light and water, history and presence, that begins Easter Day. Shopping can involve plans for large Sunday meals and a trolley load of chocolate. Or we may like to celebrate quietly, yet in dozens of small ways, this day we ready ourselves again for the utterly unexpected.

Reflections Easter Sunday

There are many potential inconsistencies in the gospel stories of the Sunday of the Resurrection but, as Mthr Dorothy told us last week, the gospel stories are not meant to be journalistic accounts. Variations are to be expected, just as with eyewitness accounts of a car accident that happened thirty minutes ago. But all the gospel accounts point to a simple reality: the tomb was empty. Not only that, but there were then experiences of encounters which were so overwhelming that there began to be talk of a 'Risen Lord'. Jesus was present to many in a range of circumstances, and it is these experiences which mark the start of Christianity.

The crucifixion was a terrible blow as all the disciples had forgotten the prefiguring hints. At the end of Friday, it seemed to be obvious that the Imperial authorities had triumphed. Three days later a major reversal had occurred: God had triumphed over the Imperial authorities. Christ's words could not be shut down by his death, nor could his life-giving presence.

The simple message of that Sunday is Jesus lives, He is risen. He is risen indeed. Importantly, this is risen in the present tense.

My favourite Easter hymn is 'Jesus Christ is risen today....' We can interpret these words to mean today we are celebrating an event which took place about 2000 years ago. But I prefer to sing the hymn as Jesus Christ is risen on 31 March 2024. He can therefore walk alongside us on this day and every day. And God, working with and through Jesus, will continue to triumph over the despots and perpetrators of injustice today, as God did back then.

Christ is risen! Alleluia!

We have come to the end of the roller coaster that is Holy Week: we have kept watch with our Lord on Maundy Thursday, listened to the unrelenting, brutal story of his trial and execution, witnessed the birth of the new fire and the return of light to our sanctuary. And now we celebrate the glory of the resurrection, the defeat of death and the magnificence of *Christus vincit*. Alleluia, indeed.

But what now?

Resurrection can be a difficult business. We've all had the experience of waiting out the agony of pins-and-needles when we've sat on our foot for too long, or slept awkwardly, disrupting blood flow. The returning of life is painful because it calls us to full feeling: every nerve is woken in the process. But without that, we are unable to use the limb. We are unable to live fully.

We are a resurrection people – we are reminded of that in every Eucharist, and on Easter Day this reminder is heightened. We are reminded of the self-giving love of our Lord: we have journeyed with him through betrayal and suffering and death, and we come now to the end of the story and the soul-deep reminder that the love of God transcends even such human awfulness. But that is not the end of the story.

A resurrection people is called to life: painful life, at times – a life of full feeling, of risk and the potential for hurt and suffering even as we are reminded that we are carried in the love of God in all that we do and all that we are. We are called to the beauty of life, to love in the world as extravagantly as we are loved. Often, to give and accept love is a risk – and yet it's a risk that changes everything.

Love demands trust: to trust each other yes, but also to trust in the God who loved us to the point of the ultimate act of self-giving – and beyond it. To trust in the God who enters human experience as fully as is possible, bringing light and love to even the darkest corners of our hearts and minds and souls. To trust in the God who bears that light and love even into death itself: who takes death and makes it safe, and kind, and simply a part of the loving experience of God in the world.

As we move past Easter Day, can we carry that knowledge with us? Can we enter more fully into that trusting relationship: through the Eucharist, through prayer, through the discipline of viewing ourselves and each other through the loving eyes of God? Can we live fully, seizing with both hands the love-filled, light-filled life we have been given – even if the shadows seem overwhelming? Can we life hopefully, a resurrection people, knowing that all we do and feel and experience – good and bad – is held in the loving light of God?

Mary Magdalene trusts in the resurrection when her Lord and teacher and friend calls her by name. We too are called by name, held, loved. We too are invited into the fullness of resurrection life: into the light and unremitting love of God.

Alleluia, indeed.


