
## THE INTRODUCTORY RITES

## Jeremiah 31.31-34


A reading from the prophet Jeremiah


A reading from the letter to the Hebrews.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.





## The Three Great Days: The Liturgy of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and the Easter Vigil

Sundays in Lent, after High Mass: 18th February, 25th February, 3rd March, 17th March (no session 10th March)

On the Sundays of Lent after High Mass, Mthr Kathryn will be giving a series of talks exploring the liturgy of the three great days ("Triduum") - that is, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Vigil.

Each year, over these days, the Church journeys with Jesus through his last mortal days into the dawning light of his resurrection. The liturgy that carries us through these days took shape particularly in the city of Jerusalem in the fourth century, and has continued to develop into the modern Western rites as we observe them today. In these sessions we will explore the history and the significance of these rituals, with an eye to understanding how they draw us, as the Church, into the great mystery of Salvation by uniting us with our Crucified and Risen Lord.

## Weekly Reflections

St Patrick, Patron Saint of Ireland, was actually born on the West coast of Roman Britain in 389, he was kidnapped by wild Irish raiders and carried off as a slave at 16 years of age. There he remained for six long years, during which, as he wrote in his 'Confessions' "I was chastened exceedingly and humbled every day in hunger and nakedness." Prompted by a dream he escaped, making his way to the coast and begging passage in a ship bound for the Continent, and later succeeded in returning to his home village.

As a youth his Christian faith sustained him in captivity: once free, he did not forget God, who had been everything to him when he had nothing. He was ordained Priest, and later consecrated Bishop. In his dreams he heard Irish voices crying out to him "We beseech you to come and walk once more among us." The Church was reluctant to validate what Patrick knew as God's call until 432 when permission was granted, and Patrick set sail for the Emerald Isle.

St Patrick made a huge contribution toward the Christianisation of Ireland, and died there, far from his home and relatives. The swirling mists of time

hold mythical tales which may distract us from his extraordinary Christian example - did he really banish snakes from Ireland, raise the dead, be first to use a shamrock to illustrate the Trinity for instance? Does it matter?

What we do know is that he trusted God's call to return to the place of his earlier torment with the Gospel, being willing to die for Jesus' sake: that he loved deeply - deeply enough to forgive his tormentors, returning good for evil. He served 30 years as Bishop, baptising thousands of people and ordaining hundreds of Irish Priests; ever humble and thankful, praising God for the privilege of his vocation.


The stirring words of the hymn 'St Patrick's Breastplate' attributed to Patrick are a testimony of Trinitarian grace, providence and faithfulness, and a proclamation of faith in Christ, which encapsulate the spirit of the man himself. The following is a short excerpt: 'I bind unto myself the name, the strong name of the Trinity... Christ be with me, Christ within me, Christ behind me, Christ before me, Christ beside me... Christ in quiet, Christ in danger... Christ in mouth of friend and stranger.'
