PASTORAL CARE REVIEW

Background

The Pastoral care review is one of two reviews recommended by the Statutory Parish Meeting earlier this year. The Parish Council appointed a committee to steer the process, chaired by Dr Stephen Duckett.

Reviewer

Shirley Nash is a Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) Supervisor, and has been a Pastoral Care practitioner for 18 years. Prior to that, her background was in Education and H.R. Shirley is a lifelong Anglican with experience on Parish Councils, Mission Planning, and as a Warden. Shirley is looking forward to conversations with parishioners about the future of Pastoral Care in the parish.

Terms of reference

- To review the pastoral care needs of the parish and people who use the site.
- To identify the best strategy to ensure that pastoral care needs are met, using both stipended staff and volunteers.
- To identify appropriate training needs for volunteers.
- To propose a process for on-going evaluation of the effectiveness of the Parish's pastoral care program.

Proposed approach

- One-on-one interviews with key staff and volunteers.
- Group meetings with: Review Committee; Parish Council; Pastoral Care Team.
- Sunday forums after Mass.
- Receiving written submissions (particularly from those not able to attend the scheduled meetings).
- Writing a Report for the Review Committee, which will in due course be shared with first Parish Council, and then the Annual Meeting of the Parish in November.

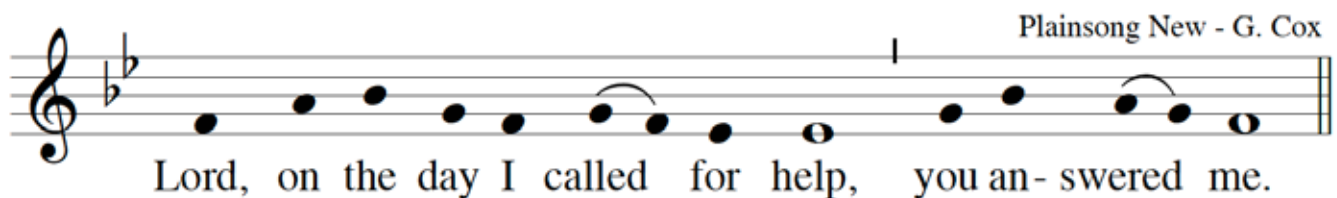

MASS READINGS

First Reading: Genesis 18.20-21, 23-32

The Lord appeared to Abraham by the oaks of Mamre and said, “How great is the outcry against Sodom and Gomorrah and how very grave their sin! I must go down and see whether they have done altogether according to the outcry that has come to me; and if not, I will know.” Then Abraham came near and said, “Will you indeed sweep away the righteous with the wicked? Suppose there are fifty righteous within the city; will you then sweep away the place and not forgive it for the fifty righteous who are in it? Far be it from you to do such a thing, to slay the righteous with the wicked, so that the righteous fare as the wicked! Far be that from you! Shall not the Judge of all the earth do what is just?” And the Lord said, “If I find at Sodom fifty righteous in the city, I will forgive the whole place for their sake.” Abraham answered, “Let me take it upon myself to speak to the Lord, I who am but dust and ashes. Suppose five of the fifty righteous are lacking? Will you destroy the whole city for lack of five?” And the Lord said, “I will not destroy it if I find forty-five there.” Again Abraham spoke to the Lord, “Suppose forty are found there.” He answered, “For the sake of forty I will not do it.” Then Abraham said, “Oh do not let the Lord be angry if I speak. Suppose thirty are found there.” The Lord answered, “I will not do it, if I find thirty there.” Abraham said, “Let me take it upon myself to speak to the Lord. Suppose twenty are found there.” The Lord answered, “For the sake of twenty I will not destroy it.” Then Abraham said, “Oh do not let the Lord be angry if I speak just once more. Suppose ten are found there.” The Lord answered, “For the sake of ten I will not destroy it.”

Second Reading: Colossians 2.6-14

Brothers and sisters, as you have received Christ Jesus the Lord, continue to live your lives in him, rooted and built up in him and established in the faith, just as you were taught, abounding in thanksgiving. For in him the whole fullness of deity dwells bodily, and you have come to fullness in him, who is the head of every ruler and authority. In him also you were circumcised with a spiritual circumcision, by putting off the body of flesh in the circumcision of Christ. When you were buried with Christ in baptism, you were also raised with him through faith in the power of God, who raised Christ from the dead. And when you were dead in trespasses and the uncircumcision of your flesh, God made you alive together with him, when he forgave us all our trespasses, erasing the record that stood against us with its legal demands. He set this aside, nailing it to the cross.

Gospel: Luke 11.1-13

Jesus was praying in a certain place, and after he had finished, one of his disciples said to him, “Lord, teach us to pray, as John taught his disciples.” He said to them, “When you pray, say: ‘Father, hallowed be your name. Your kingdom come. Give us each day our daily bread. And forgive us our sins, for we ourselves forgive everyone indebted to us. And do not bring us to the time of trial.’” And Jesus said to the disciples, “Suppose one of you has a friend, and you go to him at midnight and say to him, ‘Friend, lend me three loaves of bread; for a friend of mine has arrived, and I have nothing to set before him.’ And your friend answers from within, ‘Do not bother me; the door has already been locked, and my children are with me in bed; I cannot get up and give you anything.’ “I tell you, even though he will not get up and give him anything because he is his friend, at least because of his persistence he will get up and give him whatever he needs. So I say to you: Ask, and it will be given you; search, and you will find; knock,

and the door will be opened for you. For everyone who asks receives, and everyone who searches finds, and for everyone who knocks, the door will be opened. Is there anyone among you who, if your child asks for a fish, will give a snake instead of a fish? Or if the child asks for an egg, will give a scorpion? If you then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will the heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him!”

Faculty of Theology and Philosophy guest lecture: Professor Didier Pollefeyt, KU Leuven

Nazism as an attack on Monotheism: Ethics and theology after the Holocaust

The Holocaust casts a heavy shadow over the twenty-first century. The Nazi extermination camps radically call into question the very foundations of Christianity, modernity and the postmodern world. Pollefeyt's work challenges and critically reconstructs ethics and theology by bearing witness to the victims, as well as shedding light on the perpetrators and bystanders, thus providing the basis for a renewed Christian understanding of good and evil for our time.

Pollefeyt has developed a comprehensive and interdisciplinary post-Holocaust ethics and theology, charting questions at the heart of a new synthesis: our concepts of God, the human person and the (post)modern world, as well as our understanding of ecology, politics, education, sacred texts, Christology, interreligious dialogue, forgiveness and reconciliation and eschatology.

This lecture will engage with some of these issues as explored in his latest book.



Didier Pollefeyt is a Catholic theologian and full professor of the Katholieke Universiteit Leuven, Belgium.

In the Faculty of Theology and Religious studies, he teaches catechetics, religious pedagogy, post-holocaust theology and Jewish-Christian dialogue. As Holocaust scholar, he works on an ethical and theological analysis of the Holocaust and the development of the foundations of 'ethics and theology after Auschwitz'. As chairman of the *Center for Peace Ethics*, he develops an analysis of the questions of evil, guilt, remembrance, forgiveness and reconciliation.

Didier Pollefeyt has published widely about the ethical and theological problems connected to the encounter of Judaism with Christianity. His latest book is *Ethics and Theology after the Holocaust* (Leuven, Peeters, 2018).

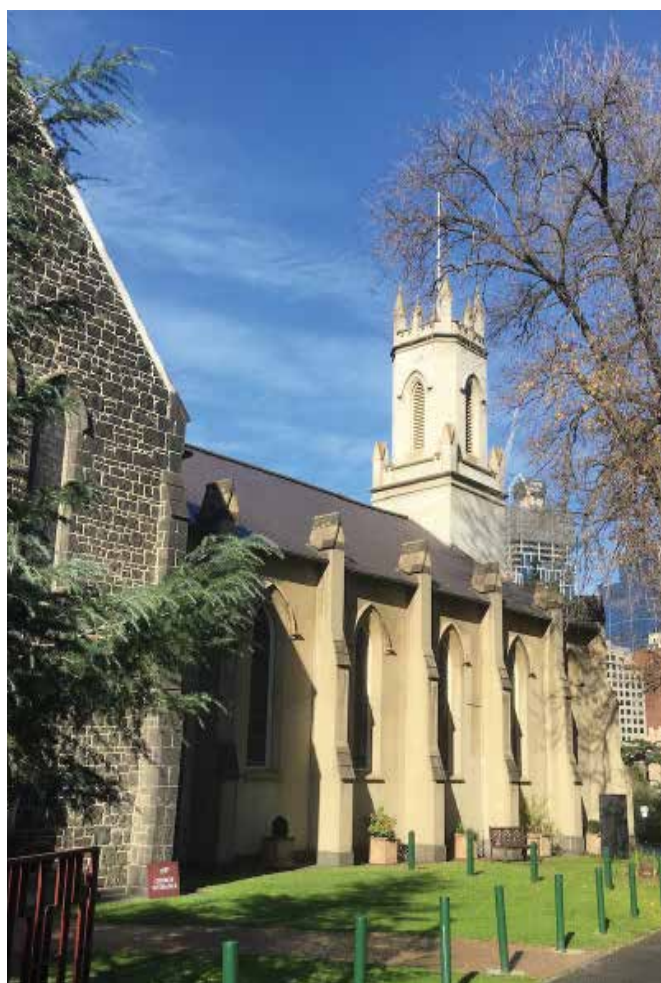

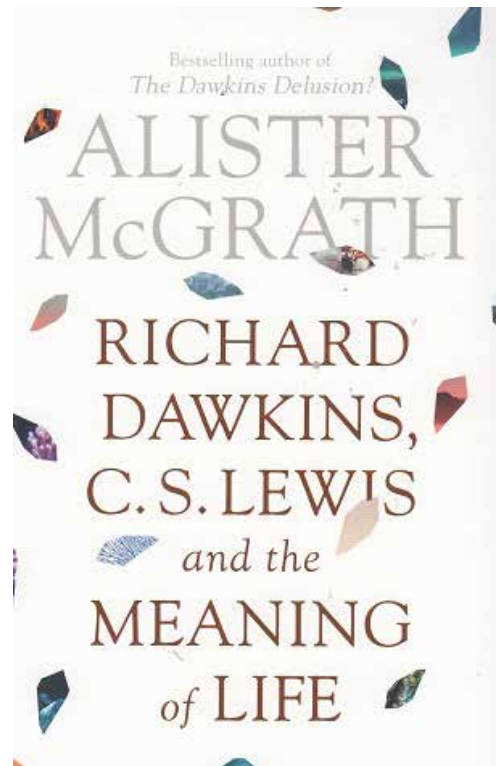
