Vicar's Musings


Happy St Peter's Day! As we celebrate our Patronal Festival this year, in such a different and dispersed manner, I have been reflecting on what it means to be "church" in this time of pandemic, or at any time for that matter. Ecclesiastes 4:12 evokes the metaphor of a "threefold cord" that is not quickly broken. As a parish over recent months I have seen a threefold cord that has given us remarkable resilience through the tough times: connection with God, connection with one another, connection across time.

Connection with God. At our Pastoral Care team meeting this week, coordinator Di Clark shared a beautiful reflection from Franciscan author and contemplative, Richard Rohr: In Sunday School, I learned to think of God as a very old white-bearded man on a throne, who stood above creation and occasionally stirred it with a stick. When I am dreaming quantum dreams, what I see is an infinite web of relationship, flung across the vastness of space like a luminous net. It is made of energy, not thread. As I look, I can see light moving through it as a pulse moves through veins. The post-communion prayer, from the 1928 B.C.P. puts it like this: we are very members incorporate in the mystical body of thy Son, which is the blessed company of all faithful people. In our daily Mass there is a constant reminder, at the passing of The Peace, that we are Body of Christ. Like Rohr's "infinite web" we are connected in Christ, energised and nurtured in and through the vitality of the Spirit, infused by the mystery of the love of God. This is true when we gather for Mass, but equally true, by God's grace, in our necessary pandemic dispersion.

Connection with one another. This has been one of the great challenges of being church during the COVID-19 lockdown and restrictions. As the Parish Council met by Zoom on Wednesday, however, I felt deeply proud of our church and the creative ways our staff, volunteer leaders, and various ministry teams have sustained and fostered connections against the odds. The St Peter's Social Enterprise meals program distributed its 28,000th meal this week, caring for those we are calling Melbourne's new poor: international students and others who lost their casual jobs overnight and have little or no other means of support. Our Lay Minister, Alae Taule'alo, presented a report on the recent Online Ministry parish survey. The Report details a variety of ways that we have connected virtually during the crisis, with recommendations for developing this fledgling ministry further (you can view the report on the "Parish Groups" page of our website or click here). The St Peter's Telephone Tree has been another way that we have kept in

touch as a parish, with the aim of our 22 Callers touching base with all 161 people on the parish roll every couple of weeks (if you've not received a call and would like to, please drop me a line and I will make sure you are added to the Tree). Di Clark and the Pastoral Care team have continued to connect with the sick of the parish, and those in particular need during the crisis, and you can see elsewhere in this week's Pew Sheet a new initiative that Fr Roger is launching this week: St Peter's Prayer Link. The St Peter's Bookroom, led by Carol O'Connor, is another ministry of the parish that continues to foster connections among parishioners as well as across the Diocese.

Connection across time. We are a church deeply conscious of our tradition and heritage. This is another of the great strengths of St Peter's. When the pandemic forced us to close the West Door to the public on 22nd March 2020, I imagined that this was the first such occasion in the history of St Peter's. But then a parishioner recalled the polio pandemic of the 1950s, and just this week Fr Philip pointed me to a photograph that I had forgotten in Fr Colin Holden's history of St Peter's. It records a Mass celebrated a century ago from the steps of our church during the 1919 influenza epidemic. Canon Hughes and the Sacred Ministers are kneeling before an Altar placed at the West Door. The Choir and congregation are all kneeling or seated at pews placed outside, in the church grounds, to help prevent the spread of the virus. We can and do draw strength from those who have gone before us; the giants (and humble souls) on whose shoulders we stand.




Sunday Mass Readings

First Reading: Acts 12.1-11

In those days, King Herod laid violent hands upon some who belonged to the church. He had James, the brother of John, killed with the sword. After he saw that it pleased some of the people, he proceeded to arrest Peter also. This was during the festival of Unleavened Bread. When he had seized him, he put him in prison and handed him over to four squads of soldiers to guard him, intending to bring him out to the people after the Passover. While Peter was kept in prison, the church prayed fervently to God for him. The very night before Herod was going to bring him out, Peter, bound with two chains, was sleeping between two soldiers, while guards in front of the door were keeping watch over the prison. Suddenly an angel of the Lord appeared and a light shone in the cell. He tapped Peter on the side and woke him, saying, "Get up quickly." And the chains fell off his wrists. The angel said to him, "Fasten your belt and put on your sandals." He did so. Then he said to him, "Wrap your cloak around you and follow me." Peter went out and followed him; he did not realize that what was happening with the angel's help was real; he thought he was seeing a vision. After they had passed the first and the second guard, they came before the iron gate leading into the city. It opened for them of its own accord, and they went outside and walked along a lane, when suddenly the angel left him. Then Peter came to himself and said, "Now I am sure that the Lord has sent his angel and rescued me from the hands of Herod and from all that the people were expecting."

The Lord will rescue me from every evil attack and save me for his heavenly kingdom. To him be the glory forever and ever.

Gospel: Matthew 16.13-19

When Jesus came into the district of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, "Who do people say that the Son of Man is?" And they said, "Some say John the Baptist, but others Elijah, and still others Jeremiah or one of the prophets." He said to them, "But who do you say that I am?" Simon Peter answered, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God." And Jesus answered him, "Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah! For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father in heaven. And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not prevail against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven."

ST PETER'S PRAYER LINK

AN INITIATIVE OF THE PASTORAL CARE TEAM

This week our Pastoral Care Team is launching a new initiative: the St Peter's Prayer Link.

We are inviting parishioners and others to submit prayer requests, which will trigger focused prayer support from a small group of pray-ers, for one month from the date of the request being made. Further prayer requests may be made, but the prayer focus does not automatically continue beyond a month. The St Peter's Prayer Link does not replace the weekly Prayer List that is published in the Pew Sheet, and used at Mass each day of the week. Rather, this is intended as a prayer boost, additional private prayer support for those who request it.

Prayers for the month may be requested for those who are sick, but also for particular situations or concerns that are weighing heavily on you. They say that a problem shared is a problem halved. Similarly, a prayer shared is a prayer multiplied.

Fr Roger Prowd is the St Peter's Prayer Link coordinator. The others in the Prayer Link at this inaugural stage are: Fr Hugh, Di Clark, Xeverie Swee, and Peter Yewers. We anticipate bringing one or two other members of the Pastoral Care team onto the Prayer Link in the coming weeks. Who these new members are will be communicated clearly in the weekly Pew Sheet. Confidentiality is of course paramount to this model of prayer support, so be assured that prayer requests will be kept strictly private amongst the Prayer Link group. Prayer requests will not be made public at Mass, nor shown in the Pew Sheet.

To ensure effective, confidential and accurate communication, all prayer requests should be made to the coordinator, Fr Roger, only. Fr Roger will then pass the request to the others in the Prayer Link. If you would like additional confidentiality for your prayer request, just mention this to Fr Roger, and your petition will be circulated to the Prayer Link group anonymously. Over the pandemic period the social enterprise has also built up a meals program in partnership with State Parliament and RMIT University.

Right now, we are holding our Annual Appeal and we urgently need your help to continue to do our work helping those in need.






