

Then the Lord God will wipe away the tears from all faces, and the disgrace of his people he will take away from all the earth, for the Lord has spoken.



## Weekly Reflections

From Philip Harvey

What to do? This past week the world has watched the obscene violence out of Gaza and the predictable and obscene retaliation. The world, as we call it, has responded with the mixture of responses such warfare elicits: horror, dismay, anger, resignation, watchfulness. But also, in many quarters, side-taking, name-calling, temperature-raising, ultimatum-making, unholy noise. What to say?

In these circumstances, reading Scripture is not an academic exercise. Names and places that are biblical are suddenly frontpage, their message very direct to our own experience, even if we have never been to the Holy Land. We know that the very meaning of these places exists in competing versions of scriptural interpretation. Where to begin?

Isaiah, in one breath, speaks of cities that "will never be rebuilt" while privileging a God who has been "a refuge to the poor, a refuge to the needy in their distress." The prophet is versed in "ruthless nations", yet he speaks with sureness that they will come to fear the Lord. Furthermore, he then speaks of how "the Lord of hosts will make for all peoples a feast," not just some peoples, all peoples. He will "destroy the shroud that is cast over all peoples." What to think?


Today's psalm is famously an acknowledgement of presence, comfort, and mercy. The song asserts the sovereignty of the good, goodness that "shall follow me all the days of my life." Yet the words arise in a place called "the darkest valley", where evil exists for real and not just in some notional fashion. The singer holds steadfast, aware that even though enemies are all about, "I shall not want". There is a clear confirmation of stillness, no matter what stupidity and chaos may be going on. Indeed, to go towards and find that place of stillness, is to value its availability, whether we find ourselves in a disaster zone, or are just processing the bad news online at home.

Today's Gospel, the Parable of the Wedding Banquet, offers another way of understanding the feast in Isaiah and the all-you-can-eat-and-drink welcome of the psalm. But are we dressed for the occasion? Are we ready? What to do?
